


Today we are here to talk about solutions that will get all of our students meeting standards for academic achievement.

We also know that we cannot overcome the challenges we face on our own.

We need to combine our school district's resources with resources in the broader community if we are going to be effective.



The majority of these partners are within a 3 mile radius of our main office for the school district. These potential partners have always been our neighbors, but we only began developing these collaborative relationships over the past two years. We realized that the social and emotional development of our students was not some tangential piece of a successful education. We knew that we had to make it a priority. Given the economic challenges that all communities face, we knew we had to reach out to our neighbors for the good of our students.



It is important that we have a framework which provides an established structure to keep all of this work focused and integrated. This public health model is only aligned with the SDE's SRBI model.

Our school staff provide services and interventions at all tiers as part of our regular education and special education programming. Services from collaborating partners are listed below.

- -ECC at Church St. School; funding from CFGNH & CHF; partnering with SCSU & YCSC; providing behavioral support in classrooms, parenting classes in the evening & preparing to offer in-home family support through YCSC and Jean Adnopoz who developed the Intensive In-Home Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Services (IICAPS) model -JRB; partnering with Hamden Youth Svcs.; NH Family Alliance and Hamden Police Dept. with financial support from the Mayor
- -Attendance Grant; funding from OPM and Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee Tier 3 Tertiary Prevention
- -Working to pilot at least one School-Based Health Center in collaboration with YCSC



Addressing the social and emotional needs of our students through strategic partnerships will improve academic achievement for our students which will create opportunities for success. This will lead to better opportunities and a brighter future for our community as a whole.

We will continue seek partnerships between our school district, government agencies, community organizations, health care providers, and private foundations as we maintain funding and provide access to valuable services that prevent & ameliorate difficulties for our students.
